Perspectives on the Holocaust – A Four Part Series, in partnership with the Holocaust Education Resource Council (HERC), *Mondays, Nov. 18, 25, Dec. 2, and 9, at 10 a.m.*

Location info for films and lectures below:

11/18 Film: “Pastor Hall,” released by United Artists in 1940, is loosely based on the story of Rev. Martin Niemoller, who challenged Nazism from his pulpit and was sent to Dachau for his resistance.

11/25 Lecture: The Holocaust Death Camps by Lauren Ray, a volunteer docent at the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum. Through photos and recollections from a 2018 trip to Poland with SMU’s School of Human Rights, participants will learn about each of the six death camps in Poland (including Auschwitz-Birkenau) and see them as they are today.

12/2 Lecture: Science and the Holocaust: Lauren Ray will discuss how the Nazis and their collaborators used and misused science, engineering, and medicine to fit their objectives and how scientists were victims and perpetrators.

12/9 Film: “Hitler’s Children,” a 1943 RKO film which uses a haunting love story to dramatize the Nazification of youth in Germany from infants through teens in the Nazi education system.

Films will show from 10 am – 12:30 p.m., at Red Hills Retirement Resort Theater, (5103 Cold Harbor Dr., off Ox Bottom Rd). Lectures are from 10 – 11:30 a.m., at the NE Branch Library (5513 Thomasville Rd). Per film/lecture - \$5 donation (50+) / \$7 (others).
