2021 YEAR IN REVIEW

Committed to its mission to be the national leader in the delivery of public service, the City of Tallahassee excelled over the past year in meeting the needs of the community. It made substantial progress on strategic priorities to ensure the strength of the community, the vibrancy of neighborhoods, the economic growth of the region and the preservation of natural resources.

The City remained focused on the health of the community by engaging in COVID-19 vaccination and mitigation efforts. With partners, the City hosted 24 vaccine clinics that administered 30,000 inoculations. It established new protocols for City-owned facilities, recreational activities and co-sponsored events, keeping in step with CDC guidelines. It proactively pursued and connected residents to federal grants and American Rescue Plan (ARP) funding. With leadership from the City Commission, a balanced budget for Fiscal Year 2022 was proposed and adopted that allocates \$18 million toward meeting critical community needs caused by COVID-19.

Guided by its strategic plan, work continued to combat poverty and improve quality of life. This included supporting the development of more than 1,300 new affordable housing units and the allocation of \$16.3 million in ARP funding to support emergent human service

needs. The City provided more than \$2 million in facade improvement grants for 100 homes within the Greater Bond neighborhood. It also connected at-risk youth to education and economic opportunities. The City's TEMPO program had 70 participants earn their GED this spring, the largest cohort in the program's history.

Through strategic investments, the City affirmed its positioning as a competitive, sustainable, best-in-class capital city. This year, it attracted more than \$840 million in private development, projected to bring more than 5,000 new jobs to Tallahassee.

The City earned top awards for its sustainability efforts, including Gold-level LEED certification and the Florida Airport Council J. Bryan Cooper Environmental Award for its airport-based solar farm. Becoming the Best Public Utility in America, the City won the prestigious E. F. Scattergood System Achievement Award. It also earned industry recognition for having one of the 100 Best Fleets in the nation and the Best Disc Golf Course in the state.

ASH IS NOT TRASH

When the weather outside is frightful, a warm fire can be so delightful. Even after a fire dies down, however, coals, embers and ash can retain enough heat to rekindle a fire. Let them cool in place for several days then remove them using a metal shovel and metal container. Wet them down in the container and store them away from combustible materials and refuse. Do not dispose of these items in your garbage container. Cooled, wet ashes can be added to your compost pile or sprinkled around your garden to add nutrients to the soil.

RECYCLE YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

After the holiday season, recycle your live-cut Christmas tree. The easiest way is to place it behind the curb on your scheduled yard waste collection day. Please remove all decorations first! Customers are reminded to separate yard waste piles from any bulky items set out for pickup. There will also be community drop off sites at Tom Brown Park (443 Easterwood Drive), Myers Park (913 Myers Park Drive) and San Luis Park (131 San Luis Road) where you can take your Christmas tree to be recycled into mulch for use in City parks.

WINTER WEATHER TIPS

When a freeze warning is issued for Tallahassee by the National Weather Service, you can take simple steps to help protect your family, your pipes and your pets.

- Insulate all exposed outside pipes.
- Exercise caution when using supplemental heating units. Keep combustible materials, such as drapes or chairs, at least three feet away from any heating unit.
- Bring outside pets indoors during cold snaps, especially at night when temperatures dip to their lowest.
