JUSTICE PEGGY QUINCE recently spoke to several dozen participants at a spring break sports camp at the Walker/Ford Community Center in Tallahassee. The inner-city participants, ages 5 to 12, peppered the justice with questions, including how old someone had to be to become a justice ("I was pretty old"), how many books she had read ("I have read a lot of book in my lifetime, but I love to read"), what kinds of cases she handled as a lawyer (family, criminal, and criminal appeals), and what it's like to sit in a judge's chair. "It is a serious responsibility," Quince replied, noting judges decide issues affecting life, liberty, and property. "You have to spend the time and energy to make the right decision." The camp engaged kids in sports and dance activities during their spring break, giving them something to do during the day when they might otherwise be unsupervised. It was funded by Tallahassee resident Martha Weinstein through the Jesse Correia Memorial Fund set up in memory of her late son who died at 5½.
