

**Planting Trees Near Overhead Electric Power Lines**

As everyone knows, trees are a wonderful addition to your landscape. They keep you cool in the hot summer sun. They make a great place to hang a tire swing for your children. They also provide food and cover for a wide variety of wildlife. As wonderful as trees are they don't get along well with overhead power lines, at least most of them don't.

While your Electric Utility does not encourage planting trees near overhead power lines there are times when it is unavoidable. These include:

1. Local ordinances require the planting of trees to replace ones that were removed during construction of a new home or business.
2. You want to plant a tree in memory of a loved one but you have a small yard with power lines running across the front of it.
3. You and your children just want to plant a tree to celebrate Arbor Day.

To handle these types of situations the City's Electric Utility Forester has developed a list of trees that are "power line friendly". This means that they can grow to maturity without needing to be pruned away from the main electric lines along the street. Some of these suggested trees provide color to your yard, food for the birds, some can be used to screen off unsightly areas, and some can even help conserve energy.
