A COMMUNITY APPROACH TO SAFETY

In 2019, our community had energetic and robust conversations about public safety. Like never before, residents participated in activities and contributed to decisions relating to the Tallahassee Police Department. That momentum has carried into 2020.

One of the largest engagement efforts of the past year was the process to identify a location for the next police headquarters. TPD has outgrown its current headquarters, which was originally built as a school and is nearly 100 years old. Building a new facility will require a large public investment and have ripple effects for the surrounding community. Ensuring residents have a voice in the process is vital.

Launching the effort, 68 site proposals were received from the community. Through multiple rounds of evaluation and public input, the list was narrowed multiple times. After considering community feedback and property analyses, the City Commission selected the Northwood Centre site to be the next home of TPD's headquarters.

The second site under consideration – the Lake Bradford Road Wastewater Treatment Plant – will also be developed; the Commission voted unanimously to build a new Tallahassee Fire Department station at the location.

As this project moves from a bold idea to physical amenities for our city, community input will continue to be incorporated.

Leading the charge for TPD will be the newly hired Chief of Police, who was selected from a nationwide pool of 52 candidates following a robust selection process. In January, Chief Lawrence Revell was sworn-in and immediate took steps to strengthen community engagement, hosting and attending a variety of events to develop a dialogue with residents. To continue this effort and enhance the flow of information between TPD and the community, he established a Citizens Advisory Committee.

Additionally, TPD continues to implement proactive, community-based solutions that complement law enforcement efforts, from prevention campaigns like #9PMRoutine to community philanthropy like Bigs in Blue to educational classes like RAD (Rape Aggression Defense).

These efforts reflect the holistic approach required to affect real change in public safety. Moving forward, the City and TPD will continue to work hand-in-hand with residents to make Tallahassee safer, resilient and inclusive.



CASH FOR TRASH RETURNS

Cash for Trash will be held on Saturday, April 18, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. for residential customers. The event will take place at the City's Community

Beautification and Waste Management facility, 2727 Municipal Way. As a thank you for participating, City residential utility customers with active garbage service will receive a \$5 credit toward their utility bill. Customers may bring large bulky items such as furniture, appliances, large toys and special wastes such as batteries, fluorescent lamps, computers and automobile tires (limit of four per customer; no commercial tires) for disposal or recycling.
